FROM THE DIRECTOR-GENERAL

It is hard to believe that we are halfway through 2022. I am happy to mark this milestone with our second Quarterly Report of 2022, giving an overview of our progress from April to June. It tracks the indicators proposed in the <u>Programme of Activities and Budget 2022-23</u>, presenting key facts and figures from the reporting period.



As we conclude the second quarter, we remain firm in the belief that we must use the powerful tools of dialogue and cultural heritage to promote peace. On 4 May, our Council expressed its <u>concerns about the conflict's impact</u> on people and cultural heritage, urging ICCROM and partners to continue supporting those conserving heritage in Ukraine. I do not take this resolution lightly, and I assure you that we will do everything possible within our mandate's scope.

Making our valuable resources more accessible has been in sharp focus this quarter, with new translations of our publications now available for free download on our website: <u>Emergency Evacuation of Heritage Collections</u> in Ukrainian, the <u>PATH</u> peacebuilding assessment tool in Arabic, <u>A Story of Change</u> case studies in French – and there are more in the pipeline. We also aim to engage more groups of people, with youth being a top priority. In May, we launched the <u>Youth.Heritage.Africa</u>. to empower and connect young heritage leaders to make heritage a source of economic and social opportunity. Additionally, this year's <u>ICCROM-Sharjah Awards</u>, held in June, shined a spotlight on youth with the Arab Cultural Heritage Award for the Young – alongside the grand prize competition, which sets examples for future heritage professionals.

Fostering inclusivity and cooperation requires intentional dialogue. In April, the <u>regional meeting for Latin America and the Caribbean</u> gathered more than 140 people from 25 countries and partner institutions. We discussed ICCROM's recent regional advancements, underscoring the importance of partnership in this work, and presented various ways that Member States can team up with us to achieve shared goals.

We are grateful for the Member States, groups and individuals that have joined ICCROM's network this quarter. The larger our network grows, the more significant the impact we can make. For this reason, we are particularly honoured to announce that the ICCROM family has grown by one. Please join me in welcoming <u>Tajikistan as our newest Member State</u>. We look forward to involving Tajikistan in upcoming projects and encourage our Member States to do the same.

I am pleased with ICCROM's accomplishments this quarter. As we enter the second half of 2022, I call on all of us to intensify our efforts to conserve and promote heritage worldwide, regardless of the challenges we face.
